


# ANNUAL REPORT 2023-2024


#### WHAT ARE THEIR MAIN RESPONSIBILITIES?

The Governors are ultimately responsible for the overall management of the school.



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#### **REVIEW OF THE 2022/2023 YEAR**

**Enrolment and Staffing** 

The healthy trend in enrolment continues. By the end of the year, we had 269 pupils on roll. The Department of Education also turned away 12 applications for Nursery in 22/23. Our teaching compliment including the principal was 11.28 teachers. Our SENCo teacher worked four days per week and an additional SEN teacher also worked three full days per week with children across the school who have additional needs. An Engage teacher was also employed for five full days per week until Easter 2023, when the funding ended. This offered additional support and assistance to pupils requiring interventive measures to support with learning and social emotional and behavioural challenges.

Our school facilitated multiple student placements: One student teacher from Stranmillis Two from NWR College of Further Education Five from Strabane Academy Two from Holy Cross Two from Omagh Academy

All of these programmes of placement enabled us to provide a large measure of one-to-one and small group support for many pupils as well as in class assistance under the direction of their teachers thus providing the students with invaluable lifelong experiences in their designated fields.

#### **Pantomime**

The children were excellent as always and the experience proved to be a very rewarding one for both audience and performers. To all who came to these performances we would like to express our sincere thanks for contributing to the success of the nights by being such encouraging audiences. Thank you too to our pupils, teachers, parents, PTFA and Mrs Fallows for all the work done both in the build-up and during the live shows. It was a roaring success. Thanks to our instrumentalists and Mrs Simpson for their Musical performance on the opening show. Thanks to Pepper Collective who recorded and produced the DVD for us.

#### **Sport**

In addition to the wide variety of sporting activities experienced through the NI curriculum, our pupils were involved in many sporting activities:

- Y7 competed in a local Schools Cross Country Competition
- Football team events at Castlederg and Melvin after school sessions, tournaments (thanks to parents for supporting and transporting)
- A block of 15 weeks Swimming lessons in Years 6 and 7.
- The much-anticipated return to the In-house rounder's tournament. Classes from Year 4 Year 7 were collated with pupils from each of the 4 year groups creating teams. This continues to generate considerable excitement and fun as well as noise when the winning team was announced! Congratulations to the winners and all who took part.
- Maiden city soccer after school from Y3 Y7
- Y7 Safe Cycling Awareness
- Y7 Girls Netball team participated in a local netball tournament
- Extended schools' Multi-skills coaching sessions from Y1 Y7 teaching and developing the foundational skills in movement and control whilst incorporating skills based activities.

- Highland Dancing ran weekly sessions for all pupils from Nursery Y7 including assessed exams in April
- Daily Mile Walk for pupils from N Yr. 7
- Nursery Big Toddle
- Yr. 7 ziplining, Tree trekking and 10-pin bowling

Yr. 3/4, Yr. 4/5, Y5/6, Y6 and Y7 classes participated in the Northwest Cricket Union School Partnership programme for all during Term 3 including Cricket coaching and competitive Cricket events hosted at a range of venues including Fox Lodge CC, Strabane CC and Bready CC.

Our annual Junior and Senior Sports Day saw the customary large turnout of parents. This added greatly to the success of the event as did the weather which was kind to us on providing a warm and sunny day. Thank you to our local Spar shop who sponsored the event and gave the children a bottle of water and a piece of fruit each.

#### **Extended Schools**

With Extended Schools funding we were able to continue with the breakfast club every morning before school 8.15 – 8.45am. Once again our after schools has been able to complement our curricular provision with an 18-week after school Maths Catch up programme for P5, P6 and P7 and Literacy support lessons for pupils in Y4, Y 5 and Y6. We continued the WellComm Speech and Language Toolkit for the nursery and continued the Musical Pathways programme to Nursery, P1 and P1/2. The Accelerated Reading programme continues to be very successful and we have extended this license as well as purchased additional resources here. The senior children were able to avail of the services of 'New Horizons' for our School Gardening club culminating in a stall at the summer fair and as well as 'take homes' for planting. We continued this year to support the needs of our pupils with regard to NewLife Counselling and Art Therapy, supporting those children and their families who need specialised support. Maiden City Soccer delivered After Schools football to classes from Y3 right up to Y7 throughout the school year.

#### **Parental Involvement**

As well as general informal meetings parents had with teachers, formal parent interviews took place in October for Y6 and Y7 pupils in February for pupils in N- Y5. There were excellent turnouts at all sets of interviews – thank you for your support. Parents also received a detailed written report about their child's achievement in June. In addition to this P7 pupils were presented with Records of Achievement in front of their parents on Prize Day.

Y4 and Y6 parents were invited to share with their child in the Paired Reading programme with their children. Similarly, our revamped PIN programme now transformed to Times Tales Rockstars gave parents in Y5,6 and 7 opportunities to use educational mathematical games and 'apps' to support their children's mathematical development. Thanks to the PTFA and school funds, parents and children have access to the 'Mathletics' programme in school and at home.

Our Mother's Day and Father's Day breakfasts once again a large number of parents, aunts, uncles, grandparents and friends come along on each occasion. The turnouts were remarkable turn and indicative of the excellent parental support we have. Parents of children in the nursery unit benefited from the WellComm Speech and Language Programme. Our new Initiative, Sharing From the Start' in Nursery was an excellent opportunity to not only

engage with our Nursery Parents but also to partner with St Catherine's Nursery in combined activities for our Nursery pupils.

Finally, some parents were again enabled to use the Lexia programme with their children from home. Parents of children entering Nursery and P1 had induction days in June. New pupils within P2 - P7, were inducted according to their starting dates.

Communication with parents continued through the use of the School App, phone calls, face to face meetings, emails, text messaging service, school website and letters during the year.

#### Music

Special tuition in cello, viola and violin continued to be provided by the EA Western Region face to face by our EA Music Specialist, Mrs N Simpson. Children from Year 1 right through to Year 7 were involved in the Highland Dance programme with Highland Dance exams taking place in April 2023.

Chanter lessons were also taught to pupils who wished to learn this instrument from Y5 - Y7

Musical Pathways to Learning was enjoyed by our Nursery and the Y1 and Y1/2 classes. Jazz Taster sessions were enjoyed and performed to pupils from Y1 - Y7 to coincide with the Jazz Festival. The annual Strabane Rotary Choir Competition continues to be postponed.

Assemblies were conducted as normal with themes included in our assemblies. We enjoyed hymns played and topical assemblies including class assemblies, Harvest, Christmas carols and Easter.

African drumming sessions were also enjoyed by our pupils experiencing the thrill of handling and learning how to play the African drums through a workshop.

Thanks to the PTFA, a number of Discos were thoroughly enjoyed throughout the year too raising money for charity and school funds.

Our Nursery, P1 and P1/2 pupils again experienced the innovative music programme called 'Musical Pathways to Learning'. In addition to improving musical skills children's attention and listening skills including their capacity to distinguish between sounds was enhanced. All classes enjoyed significant benefits and the children's engagement was excellent especially now that it is face to face.

#### Curriculum

As you can see from the information set out in the school calendar, staff in service training continues to be delivered, some face to face but the majority online.

Training provided aims to update and extend staff expertise and experience in new areas of professional learning whilst updating current knowledge. Information gleaned by teachers at INSETs is disseminated to staff during School Development Days, Exceptional closure days, Baker days and staff meetings. Of particular note is the extensive and additional training taken to upskill staff in areas of additional needs, teaching and learning.

Training continues on training staff to overcome pupils' barriers to learning, develop knowledge of Special educational and additional needs, support children with medical conditions and promoting Shared Education.

In **Mathematics** teachers and pupils continue to use 'Mathletics' (P2-P7) and have extended their use of this at home. The average time spent online per student in Mathletics for the 2022/2023 year was on average 53 minutes per pupil per month. It continues to be an integral and invaluable resource both for home and school, reinforcing learning and new teaching. Teachers are assigning tasks regularly as homework activities and pupils are using the programme to receive the benefits it offers. The point system has been an effective incentive for pupils in Key Stage 2. There was whole school participation in World Maths Day, 8<sup>th</sup> March 2023.

All teachers completed Numeracy based targets and incorporated ideas/resources into their classroom teaching. Under the following headings:

- To promote the teaching & learning of Mathematics through Outdoor Play.
- To implement and embed Mental Maths.
- To develop the use and understanding of Maths vocabulary.
- To continue to maintain/improve standards in Maths

Three pupils in Year 5 reached 58 000 and 63 000 points respectively whilst three pupils in Year 7 reached 51 000, 54 000 and a tremendous 113 000!

The Maths Catch up programme was available for pupils in Years 5, 6 and 7 supporting areas for development in Maths whilst improving confidence and standards. Data demonstrated 77% of children who participated in this programme, improved their PTM score.

Year 4-7 pupils on average achieved in line with their ability or above – 87.5%

In **Literacy** teachers continued to use the highly motivational Accelerated Reader programme throughout KS2. We had 14 millionaires during the year in Years 5, 6 and 7 with four students achieving 2 million and two more achieving an astounding 3 million plus target.

Talking and Listening Scheme is clearly integrated into all aspects of Literacy development and language acquisition in all areas of the curriculum with a particular focus on linking language development to outdoor learning.

Y4/5 and Y5 pupils took part in Roald Dahl Day in September. Reading Catch up classes took place for Years 4, 5 and 6 pupils. Our Literacy Co-ordinator delivered the Literacy Service EA training to classroom assistants on 'Understanding the Alphabet'. Classes took part in National Poetry Day in October including participation in the BBC live lesson by older pupils. FS+KS1 took part in EA training on Spelling Strategies. The Y3/4 class visited the local library for Hallowe'en storytelling. The Book Fair was held in school in November with £2084 worth of books sold, generating commission of £1133 to be spent on books for the school. Book related competitions took place in each class. New reading material was purchased for Y1-Y3, including PM starters and Oxford Reading Tree. Speech Link, Language Link was used in the Year 1 class. The Paired Reading Programme for Y4 and Y6 took place in January running for four weeks. In February, the Y3/Y4 class visited the local

library as part of Shared Education programme, under the theme of 'Fairy-tale'. Classes took part in 'Dear Time', where the older children read to younger children during Health and Wellbeing Week. In March we enjoyed World Book Day activities and dress-up opportunities. The Y4/5 class visited the local library with a particular focus on fiction material. An employee of Libraries NI visited Year 4/5 and Year 3/4 encouraging children to take part in the Big Read Summer Challenge- 'Ready, Steady, Read.' Finally, in June Mr Martin's class experienced a Pushkin Trust Workshops Day and we had a Book Stall at our annual Summer Fair. WE celebrated eleven Year 5 pupils who had their monster poems selected for publication in a Young Writers Book.

#### **ICT**

Classes have availed of full use of the ICT suite where all classes are timetabled and make regular use of the excellent facilities we have on offer. A number of new Dell laptops were purchased through the PTFA meaning that pupils have access to 22 computers at any one time, alongside iPads. Every classroom including the Nursery has the new Promethean Smart boards and an additional new board was installed into the ICT suite meaning that teaching resourcing and facilities are ideal now for class and group settings. Two teachers availed of SMART board training alongside the installation of their classroom boards.

Online safety was taught in all classes from Primary 1-7 and a wall display highlighting the work carried out was established in the ICT suite. KPMG delivered a cyber security workshop for pupils in Year 4-7 considering internet safety.

Educational programmes to support learning including Accelerated Reader, Mathletics, Lexia and Times Tables Rockstars are well embedded throughout the school. Broad and balanced teaching of ICT through the school is evident by wall displays in classrooms and around the school building.

Through the use of Extended schools, we were able to facilitate and promote **STEM** (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) programmes with Sentinus 'Bring it on'. The Nerve centre delivered workshops in Yr. 3/4 on Scratch and Yr. 5/6 on Minecraft

Year 7 experienced a 6-week Robotics programme focusing on **LEGO MINDSTORMS® EV3.** During the Robotics programme the pupils used the LEGO® MINDSTORM Education EV3 Core Set. By combining LEGO® elements with a programmable brick, motors and sensors, students made their own robotic creations. LEGO® MINDSTORMS® EV3 were controlled remotely through Bluetooth using the Commander App which is downloaded to a tablet or smart phone.

During the Robotics programme students had the opportunity to build, control and program the Education EV3 Core Set Rover. Students began by learning simple programs and developing the skills to complete increasingly more difficult tasks using the robots touch, Ultrasonic and colour sensors.

#### **Shared Education**

Following the Department of Education's decision that 'Shared Education' should be an integral part of education in Northern Ireland, our school continues to develop and build upon the previously established partnership with Sion Mills Primary School. The overall aim of the

project is to improve educational standards and reconciliation by enabling schools to work collaboratively more often.

This our seventh year of participation in The Shared Education Project, saw a long-awaited return to pupil contact and shared projects between ourselves at Strabane Controlled PS and our partners in Sion Mill PS. From the guidance provided by EA a cautionary and manageable approach was adopted, to move into an 'education beyond Covid space.'

Effective Leadership - Staff from both schools joined together for 'Reconnection' during a planned staff development day, allowing co-ordinators to update staff on the aims, changes and focuses for Shared Education in line with the Mainstreaming Shared Education Strategy from the Department of Education. Action plans were shared with all stakeholders and the importance of the Pupil Pathway document was highlighted and presented. The Shared Education Hub was displayed, with links also provided for staff.

Co-ordinators published joint termly newsletters to inform all members of the school community about the progress and success of Shared Education throughout the year.

High Quality Teaching & Learning - Specific emphasis on Pupil Pathway learning outcomes, in addition to educational targets.

Learner Centred - Strategic planning ensured that a balance of pupils from across each key stage were engaging in shared opportunities throughout the academic year. 4 classes namely Year 1/2, Year 3/4, Year 5/6 and Year 7, successfully completed topical shared projects across a broad range of curricular areas, with a cumulative total of 226 pupils from Year 1 to 7 engaging in pupil-to-pupil contact. Responses from pupil evaluations show that for all shared projects, over 3/4 of each class reported positively about their shared experiences, including the formation of friendships and the extension of their learning. The educational visits to neutral venues proved to be the most popular within the student voice.

Community Connections - To inform and engage parents in our shared education journey, online surveys were distributed to parents of pupils who were targeted for participation in shared activity. Of those returned, all agreed that Shared Education has an important role to play in the development of good relations and is indeed a valuable aspect of their child's education.

This year planned projects made use of community halls, local schools, leisure facilities and resources to enhance delivery and to promote our partnership in the local community.

# Outdoor learning was further enhanced under these headings:

- Provision of regular opportunities for all pupils to access the curriculum through planned Outdoor Learning activities.
- Promotion of the health and well-being of all pupils through Outdoor Learning.
- Developing an outdoor area for the teaching and learning of the Arts and procurement of new resources
- Opportunities to share good practice of Outdoor Learning to enhance teaching and learning provision for Mathematics and the development of communication skills.

#### **Pastoral Care**

All of the internal elements of the preventative curriculum were successfully delivered over the course of the academic year. In addition to the cross-curricular delivery of PD&MU in all classrooms, with an emphasis on pastoral care, we continued to utilise a monthly thematic approach in conjunction with our pupil of the month awards scheme. All classes participated in the NI Anti-Bullying Week programme, (see School Council).

On a whole school level, all pupils were involved in 'Internet Safety Day' with the theme All fun and games? Exploring respect and relationships online' Exploring respect and relationships online. Information and age-appropriate activities were shared to ensure key messages were enforced and shared with our pupils.

We were again able to successfully deliver our 'Health & Well Being' Week in school, with the theme of 'Let's Connect':

- -with each other
- -through The Arts
- -on-line
- -with the world around us

We continued to avail of the services of New Life Counselling through our highly regarded Art Therapist. We continue to use the excellent and highly experienced team from 'Love for Life' sessions, in the delivery of RSE to the P7 pupils and follow the school's policy for the remaining school year groups.

Finally, with the funding ending for the well acknowledged and worthwhile cycling proficiency training (with Cycle Helmet award), a group of our staff took delivered in-house safe cycling lessons after school for our Year 7s.

#### Attendance

Parental support also plays a significant part in the good attendance figures. Attendance has been a challenge for some families and we continue to encourage and educate on the importance of good attendance which stands at 91.7% for 2022/2023 which also includes the Nursery. Full attendance certificates for 2022/2023 were given out to four Year 7 pupils, and eight from amongst Year 1- Year 6 pupils.

**Learning Support 2022 - 23** 

In September 2022 there were 55 children on the Special Needs register at stages 1-3 of the New Code of Practice (including 12 pupils who have a statement of SEN and benefit from having the support of a classroom assistant). A further three pupils have since received a statement of SEN during the 2022-23 school year.

Pupils are on our SEN register for one or more of the following reasons — Cognition and learning difficulties, Specific learning difficulties, Social, Emotional Behavioural and Wellbeing difficulties, Communication and Social Interaction difficulties; Speech, Language and Communication Needs; Physical difficulties.

Pupils were monitored throughout the year and moved either up or down through the Code of Practice stages according to their level of need. This year six pupils were removed from the register. This is because their needs are now not significant enough to require provision additional to or different from that generally available for all children. Fourteen new names

were added throughout the year (up to September 2022) as concerns were identified. These decisions were agreed by class teachers, SEN teachers and parents and were based on standardised tests scores, teacher's assessment and reports from outside agencies. A separate register is used for those who have medical needs only e.g. food allergy.

Thirty- five pupils were withdrawn from class by the school's two part - time Learning Support teachers to work on literacy, numeracy and social skills. In consultation with the class teacher Education Plans were drawn up with targets which are achievable and measurable (SMART). Work was delivered at an appropriate level, broken down into small steps and taught using a variety of strategies and materials. Throughout the year progress was monitored and assessed and provision was altered accordingly. If a need was evident which could be addressed by one of the outreach support teams, a referral was made to the appropriate outside agency, following consultation with the Educational Psychology service. Parents were kept informed, and they had the opportunity to discuss their child's progress with the special needs teachers (by telephone) at least twice during the year, or as required.

Five children were put through the literacy screening process, four of whom met the criteria to receive outreach support. This is one-to one support for an hour each week with a peripatetic teacher provided by the EA.

These services are under significant pressure and waiting lists are getting longer so it is of great benefit to our pupils that they receive a good level of support within the school.

Some ICT and after school activities which also proved successful in raising standards included: -

Paired Reading Programme

Maths Programme - Times Tables Rockstars

Lexia computer programme (for use at home and in school)

Mathletics computer programme (for use at home and in school)

Extended schools 'Catch Up' clubs for Reading/ Maths

Accelerated Reading Programme.

Throughout the year, staff availed of online training from EA to up-skill in the areas of Autism and Asperger's syndrome, Language, Literacy and SBEW. The Behaviour Support Team and RISE NI continued to provide advice and strategies to help address issues to teachers and classroom assistants throughout the school as needed.

When concerns are raised, close collaboration between SENCo, Principal and Class teachers help us to decide a course of action e.g. referrals or withdrawal support. Additional ability and attainment tests are available to be used by the SENCo on individual children to help gain more information. We remain committed to working towards early identification of pupils' needs throughout the school and we continue to work closely with any relevant agencies so that staff gain fuller understanding of pupils' difficulties, as well as strategies to help support them in school.

#### **Eco-Schools**

In September 2022, new Eco-Committee members were elected and presented with Eco-School badges.

After conducting an Environmental Review at the beginning of the year, the pupils devised an Action Plan based on our findings. As a whole, school took part in a range of whole-school initiatives and projects throughout the year.

Pupils in Years 1 and 2 enjoyed visiting the Pumpkin Patch at New Horizons Garden Centre in October. This helped to develop links with local community whilst also giving pupils the opportunity to spend time outdoors in a new environment.

Pupils from Years 4 to 7 thoroughly enjoyed taking part in our school gardening club. With the help of Mrs Smith, Mrs Fallows and staff from New Horizons Garden Centre, they continued to develop our school polytunnel and grew a variety of plants and vegetables.

For the Eco-Schools' Global Awareness topic, a total of 83 shoeboxes were donated to the Samaritan's Purse Christmas Shoebox Appeal.

On Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> December, pupils from Nursery to Year 7 took part in "The Daily Mile Santa Run" event. Pupils really enjoyed completing this activity together and received a certificate for their participation. Pupils also thought about the importance of daily exercise and the benefits of this on our mental health and well-being.

In January, pupils and staff took part in Energy Saving Week. The Eco-Committee led an assembly telling us all about the importance of saving energy when possible. Pupils and staff took part in a range of activities in order to help save energy in their homes. An online survey was used to record the activities that everyone took part in and the Eco-Committee analysed the results.

In February, pupils took part in a range of activities linked to Mental Health and Well-being week. These activities linked in very well with our eco work for the year, encouraging pupils to connect with one another and their environment. Pupils spent time connecting to nature through reading books and designing artwork.

On Thursday 27th April, pupils from all classes enjoyed participating in another outdoor activity, the Worldwide Daily Mile Challenge.

In May, pupils from the Eco-Committee were excited to launch our Animal Adoption Project once again, in partnership with Parkview Veterinary Practice. The Eco-Committee launched the project through leading a whole-school assembly. All pupils had the opportunity to vote online for their favourite animal and one animal was chosen for each Key Stage within the school. Pupils will have the opportunity to learn about each animal through gaining updates from the Worldwide Fund for Nature (WWF) throughout the new school year.

On the 28<sup>th</sup> June, the Eco-Committee held their final meeting of the year. They visited the bug hotel, the pond, the polytunnel and the play trail during their meeting, whilst discussing the benefits of their work throughout the year. Well done and thank you to the pupils for all their hard work and enthusiasm throughout the year.

#### **School Council**

Our school council again have organised and participated in a variety of events, including monthly meetings, fundraising events and discussions centred upon issues of importance to the student body and our school community as a whole.

Firstly, our council members got a taste of real-life council business during Local Democracy Week, when they were invited to visit Strabane District Council chambers and met the Major. School council members posed questions of matters of interest to school and the local community, which were addressed by the major before being bestowed with the honour of wearing the mayoral chains and taking their turns as Chair of the Chamber.

In conjunction with 'Anti-Bullying Week,' the council planned and organised 'Odd Socks Day' with staff and pupils alike adorning a variety of colourful, spotty, stripy, patterned odd socks to commence and promote the thematic week. Furthermore, in the second term school councillors organised a charity event in support of AGE NI, by planning a 'Slip Into Slippers' day. A total of £280 was raised and duly presented to a representative of Age NI during a special assembly.

Finally, in the third term council members were given the honour of presenting special gifts on behalf of pupils past and present, to mark the retirement of two of our long serving members of staff, namely Mr Harold Kerr and Mrs Carmel Maybin.

Extended school's programmes

Extended Schools Services & Activities 2022-2023 have enabled us to run our Breakfast Club five days per week 8.15 – 8.45am. We had our Literacy and Numeracy catchup after schools for pupils in KS 1 and KS 2. New Life Counselling Art therapy was enabled and Counselling took place for pupils and families. Pupils in Year 3 – Year 7 enjoyed after school Football Club run by Maiden City Soccer. Our Horticultural and Environmental Awareness Project took the form of our gardening club intertwined with the ECO Awards for pupils in Year 4/5 up to Year 7. Pupils from Year 1 – Year 7 also availed of Multi-skills physical exercise sessions with our coach. Funds also supported Reading Recovery and the delivery of our Speech and Language Toolkit.

In clustering with other schools in the local learning area, we had the Debutots Drama in Education company for early years for pupils in Year 1 and 1/2 delivering storytelling, rhyme and actions, movement to music etc. Musical Pathways to Learning programme in Years 1, Year 1/2 and Nursery. Robotics delivered to Year 7 and a Transition workshop for Key Stage 2 including Home Economics.

Budget

Full LMS budget expenditure details are provided elsewhere in this report as is information about the school's own accounts. Once again we must acknowledge the fundraising efforts of the PTFA and thank you, the parents, sincerely for the time and energy you put into ensuring the events the PTFA organised were successful. All schools now have to

demonstrate that they are sustainable across a range of criteria. This includes enrolment, finance and educational standards. In all instances our school was once again recognised by the Education Authority as secure.

Health, Safety and Security (including grounds development and maintenance work) The entire school grounds are secured with a perimeter fence including internal fencing and pedestrian gates to secure the intake and exit of Play Group, Nursery, Junior and Senior pupils throughout the day.

The traffic management of the school continues to await a Minor Works Programme with plans being progressed to reconfigure movement of traffic alongside protection of pedestrian pupils and adults using the car park. A ramp entering and exiting the school grounds is at the main entrance gates which serves as added protection to slow down traffic throughout the premises.

Works were completed on our new School Hygiene room located at the senior wing of the school.

The Mobile classroom situated at the rear of the school which houses the Strabane Community Playgroup was fully refurbished and was significantly invested in by the Education Authority - thank you to the team from EA who undertook and oversaw this project. This included replacing the four main walls, new flooring, fully replaced electrical works, new PVC windows, new doors including a new PVC front entrance door, new heating system, new lighting, freshly concreted walkway, painted inside and outside, new vinyl floor and carpet, new access control, replaced fire doors and emergency exit steps. A very successful project and a lasting job.

The concrete walkway into the Junior entrance of the school was freshly concreted, handrails leading to the backstage entrance were fitted and all railing checked and replaced where necessary.

The three classrooms located on the top floor had new ventilation systems fitted - Mr Gamble's room, Mr Martin's room and the ICT suite.

The heating system which supplies the main school and kitchen has had a complete overhaul with a significant investment form the Education Authority in replacing old and outdated heating appliances and equipment.

Mrs Clarke's classroom has had a new vinyl floor fitted and new blinds.

Our digital CCTV is fully operational. It functions 24 hours a day for overall site security and access control exists on all outside doors. All visitors are required to report to reception and sign in and out. A monitored intruder alarm protects the buildings after working hours and all equipment has security markings. The waste bins are secured away from the building as a fire prevention measure and a fire detection and emergency lighting system alongside an intruder alarm are all in full operation.

The SEP (School Enhancement Programme) is fully underway with plans progressing through the required channels as we proceed to prepare every aspect of the project prior to

breaking grounds. This is a time-consuming process but one which will be worthwhile when the end project is completed.

SMART boards were installed in all of the remaining classrooms including the ICT suite.

#### Accessibility

To facilitate access arrangements a disabled parking bay is available to blue badge holders (only) directly in front of the main entrance and all doors into the school have ramps. The main doors are also equipped with automatic opening apparatus as is the assembly hall. Finally, a chair lift operates to the classrooms on the first floor. This gives all pupils full access to every facility the school has to offer. We have a fully accessible hygiene room including a toilet and wet room built on to the Nursery and a second one built in the main school building.

#### Nursery

The nursery plans in accordance with the 2018 Northern Ireland Curricular Guidance for Preschool Education.

The WellComm speech and language programme continues to be implemented in the nursery, (funded through Extended Schools), providing speech and language screening and appropriate support for all nursery children. Again, significant improvements were noted among the participants.

For a seventh year, the nursery implemented the DE 'Early Intervention Transformation Programme' Getting Ready To Learn (GRTL). This enabled the nursery to provide each child/family with a home learning pack and the option of accessing resources through a borrow/return scheme. The home learning pack was 'gifted' to each child. Packs included a varied range of resources to support and develop the home learning environment; activity ideas; and key messages/information around the four themes within the programme.

The nursery class also joined with St. Catherine's Primary School to implement the Sharing from the Start Programme. This is a project supported by the European Union Peace IV Programme, managed by the Special EU Programmes Body (SEUPB) and offers preschool settings the opportunities to engage in a Shared Education Initiative. The programme aims to improve educational outcomes for young children and build good relations between children and adults from different backgrounds, in early years settings. The project ran through term 1, 2 and 3 during which time, both settings enjoyed hosting their partner setting and engaging in interactive sessions via the interactive whiteboards. Parents, children, and staff from both schools enjoyed a shared trip to the cinema in May. This proved to be a very positive and beneficial project for both settings.

Nursery engaged in 4 sessions with Relax Kids who aim to support children's mental and emotional health and wellbeing with a range of tools and techniques to help calm their body and mind and build confidence and self-esteem.

Little Mess Tyrone provided messy play sessions each term around planned topics including minibeasts and the beach.

Outdoor play has continued to be embraced with the development of an outdoor library area and the nursery teacher taking part in forest school training in June. The nursery class also enjoyed a class trip, by train, to Castlerock beach.

Music was enjoyed through 'Musical Pathways to Learning' sessions, aiming to promote the importance of rhythm and rhyme in early literacy.

Community links once again were embraced throughout the year with visits from Eyewear Opticians, Baker David McKnight, Nurse Henry, Barnardo's Big Toddle Team, and Mrs. Ryan with pupils from Strabane Academy Music Department.

#### Summary

The Governors continue to be greatly encouraged by the excellent support proffered year in and year out by the PTFA committee in particular and the parents in general. The high esteem which the school is held in by the wider community is also clearly demonstrated by the significant number of sponsors we have for our various activities. We wish you to know that your help is very much appreciated and does indeed make a difference to our children.

We are also delighted that the kitchen continues to maintain its Grade 5 food hygiene rating from environmental health – the highest grade possible – this is an excellent achievement for Mrs Noreen Colhoun and her staff.

Likewise, we wish to take this opportunity to express our thanks and appreciation to the principal and staff of the school for the continued high level of commitment and the excellent standards achieved both inside and outside the classroom. The Governors wish to congratulate the principal, teachers, parents and children for their efforts over the past year and commend this report on the life and work of the school to you all.
